About Red Dress Day

May 5 is the Red Dress Day and National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Woman, Girls and Two-Spirited. You may notice red dresses hanging on a balcony, or near the road side and you probably wondered what it means. It's a day to raise awareness about missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls, two spirited, and men. The Red Dress Project was in response to more than 1000 murdered and missing Aboriginal women in Canada by Jaime Black (Metis). We encourage you to wear red on May 5 and learn more about meaning of this date.

Why the Colour Red?

The colour red was chosen after Jamie Black had a conversation with an Indigenous friend who shared with her "Red" is really a calling back of the spirits of these women and allowing them a chance to be among us and have their voices heard through their family members and community. The dresses are empty, so that they evoke the missing women who should be wearing them.

Health and Safety Update

The VSB is beginning to reconsider some of the practices that took place prior to the pandemic as we return to more normal routines. At a recent Health and Safety meeting, the district indicated that they intended to require Foodsafe certification prior to handling any food. At our most recent Staff Rep Assembly, teachers identified concerns connected to parent, teacher or student provided snacks, sharing of food, food sales and staff snack and goodie days as being problem. It's VESTA's position that if Foodsafe is required by employees, the training should be paid inservice. It's VESTA's position that this is also an unnecessary and ridiculous requirement.

Further discussion will be required and we will update on this matter as events progress.

Post and Fill Workshop May 4 and 5

Thank you to Staff Reps who have already registered for the early May VESTA Post and Fill workshop. This will be a full day training that reviews aspects of the Spring Transfer process including timelines, school organization process, Staff Committee Meetings and the development of postings. If you have questions about these matters, please let your Staff Rep know so they can come prepared to the training session.

Remember that collegiality is a key driver of decisions made at the school. In years of declining enrolment, it's more important than ever to ensure we prioritize fairness and equity, seniority and transparency. Most of this can be achieved by holding open conversations in VESTA Meetings prior to meeting with the Administrators.



BCTF Health and Wellness Program

The BCTF Health and Wellness Program supports and empowers members recovering from illness or injury to regain an optimum state of wellness, health, and productivity by providing rehabilitation services and promoting self-care. It is funded by the membership of the BCTF.

Members do not need to be off work or on disability benefits in order to participate in the program. A referral to the program can be made on the basis that a member is struggling with a health matter that could become worse if it is not addressed.

It is a confidential, free service where members are paired with a Rehabilitation Consultant.

The Rehabilitation Consultants are credentialed rehabilitation professionals who are contracted by the BCTF to provide services to its members. These consultants are trained in developing rehabilitation programs suited to the needs of BCTF members and are familiar with the challenges of the teaching profession.
