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School Closure Monday, Sept.19th

To throw another wrench into our hectic first month of school, BC Premier John Horgan has declared that BC schools will be closed to observe the National Day of Mourning on Monday, Sept.19th. We've heard from members who have various concerns about the disruption at their site.

The Board met on Wednesday and relayed the following information to the VEAES office:

- 1. The VSB will work with schools to reschedule any affected Pro-d days and issue a new calendar to the school community. Pro-d days will not be lost. We raised the issue of Pro-D funding that may be lost due to the late cancellation, but have not heard a definitive answer.
- 2. Field trips and associated costs are being dealt with on a school-by school basis and the VSB is working with school administrators to reschedule field trips and to ensure that the schedules are communicated out to families.
- 3. Any elementary prep that was scheduled for the Monday will be made up. Administrators are being asked to schedule TTOCs.
- 4. Any leaves that were booked for Monday will be cancelled and sick banks will not be deducted. However, the VSB has been directed by BC Public School Employers' Association to cancel all TTOC bookings and pay will be determined based on STAT eligibility. We asserted our position that anyone booked should be paid and anyone who would have received compensation for the new federal holiday should be paid. We will be working with the BCTF on this piece. TTOCs should have received a communication from the VSB outlining their decision.

We know this is putting some undue stress onto members: losing pay, having to rearrange schedules, and reorganize events. Please talk to your Staff Rep and have them contact the VEAES office if you need support. TTOCs can contact your In-House liaison, Vanessa Lefebvre, vanessa@veaes.ca.

As mentioned in June's VEAES WEEKLY, the Professional Standards for BC Educators new video called, *Professional Standard 9 – Truth and Reconciliation, Moving Forward Together* is coming out! The BC Teacher Council anticipates that the publicly available link to the video will be released the **week of September 26**, prior to the *National Day for Truth and Reconciliation* on **September 30**.

BC educators' practice is governed by the ethics and principles as outlined in the Professional Standards. If you haven't taken a look at the Standards in awhile, please take the time to review it as it is a mandate of the BC Teachers' Council. edu standards.pdf (gov.bc.ca)

Standard 9: Educators respect and value the history of First Nations, Inuit and Métis in Canada and the impact of the past on the present and the future. Educators contribute towards truth, reconciliation and healing. Educators foster a deeper understanding of ways of knowing and being, histories, and cultures of First Nations, Inuit and Métis. Educators critically examine their own biases, attitudes, beliefs, values and practices to facilitate change. Educators value and respect the languages, heritages, cultures, and ways of knowing and being of First Nations, Inuit and Métis. Educators understand the power of focusing on connectedness and relationships to oneself, family, community and the natural world. Educators integrate First Nations, Inuit and Métis worldviews and perspectives into learning environments.

Standard 9 was added in June 2019. Standard 9 honours the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) Calls to Action and the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (DRIPA).

<u>Are you an educator with experience or interest in social media and content creation?</u>



#StatusForAll: Why is this relevant to educators?

Children of undocumented migrant workers are some of the missing students in our classrooms, for fear of being "found out" or attracting attention when engaged in the school system. These children may not be our students now, but they could be, if they and their families become permanent residents. Permanent resident status is the mechanism through which all other rights are accessed for migrants. Lack of permanent resident status makes it difficult, and often impossible, for migrants to speak up for their rights or access services, including education.
